Council Challenge

Public challenge by Tish Wilkins

Some of our residents have brought to our attention a problem which blights the lives of all of us – that of dog mess on the footpaths and from there, on occasion, in our homes.

Most dog owners are responsible and clean up after their pets, but there are a few persistent offenders who allow their dogs to run off the lead and who refuse to clean up after their animals. This problem exists everywhere, as we know, but is most prevalent on those roads that lead to the entrances to Eccles Field. SOSCA is writing to our local councillors to alert them to the problem and to ask them for some action to be taken.

In the meantime, irresponsible dog owners should be aware that local residents are upset and if you are seen not cleaning up after your dog, or allowing it off the lead on the street – if possible you will be identified and reported to Environmental Health. Allowing your dog to foul the footpath is an offence that carries a fine. Dogs must be kept under control in a public place. If your dog is untrained, this means on a lead.

Public Meeting

As promised at our A.G.M. we are holding a public general meeting to ratify the proposal of changing our A.G.M. date to April each year. This will allow more members to attend at a more convenient time during lighter evenings. The meeting will be held at the United Reformed Church on Worsley Road on **Thursday 26th April 2007 at 8.00pm.** All are welcome to attend. Who was Arthur Mathews by our local historian Gordon Purcell

In early 1971 Arthur Mathews and his family were in need of accommodation, they had just had their home damaged by fire. They were offered the old sewage works house at the end of Campbell Road on a temporary basis. In fact Arthur lived there until his death in 2002 aged 81.

Arthur was in his early fifties when he moved to Campbell Road and was working for the council laying and repairing drains. Even at this age one word would be used to describe Arthur, strong. He was about five foot seven tall and weighed about 13 stone, he had a warm, weather beaten face and a friendly smile.

Most days after work you would find him leaning on the gate to the fields chatting to the dog walkers. He loved to talk about the time when he had played rugby or about his time in the RAF. Arthur was very good with the youngsters, he would lend them a football and supply cones for goalposts. He even badgered the council to cut the grass and put up goalposts.

Though he had been a dispatch rider in the RAF he hated to see motorbikes on the field. In those days a strong word from Arthur would usually put a stop to it, if that did not work he called the police. He also sorted out any antisocial behaviour in his area or on the field by having a word with those involved and would also make a point of speaking to their parents.

Unfortunately, as he got older there were times when he was a little overprotective of the area and his interaction with local children was not always at its best. He was very protective of the fields and he worked hard at keeping the area free from litter. At one time local gardeners used to tip their cuttings on the field but Arthur soon put a stop to that practice. Often you would see him out there with his spade edging grass or clipping the hedges on the field. I have even seen him planting trees on there.



Arthur and Vera had a son, Ken and three foster children and on bonfire nights local families were invited to his bonfire in his large garden overlooking the fields. Vera would make treacle toffee and it was always a good night. At these times Arthur would invite local householders to put their unwanted disposable items on the bonfire.

When he was in his late seventies his wife Vera died. She had always given her full support in any action he had taken regarding the fields. The loss of his wife and age winning the race he lost his natural strength. Though he was no

longer able to use his physical energy to protect the fields he still cared and worried about what might happen right up to his own death in 2002.

Why, since coming to Campbell Road did this man care so much about the fields? He was not employed to do it, he was never asked to do it and it was not a condition of his tenancy. Arthur was the self-appointed warden, parkie, community support worker and Home watch coordinator rolled into one. I think it was partly out of gratitude towards lady luck for giving him a nice spot to live after the loss of his home to fire. He also valued that open space; he liked its naturalness and did not want to see it spoilt by those who would misuse it.
