He has been instrumental in setting up a residents' association. "We have to take action or we'll all end up living in fear. Having the telephone num-ber makes it so easy to know who to call and I'm sure many more people will come forward knowing that they can report anti-social behaviour easily and in confidence.

What is anti-social behaviour?

The term 'anti-social behaviour' includes a variety of behaviour covering a whole complex of selfish and unacceptable behaviour that can blight the quality of community life and can include:

- litter dropping, rubbish dumping and fly tipping causing graffiti and vandalism abandoning vehicles nuisance neighbours

- intimidation and harassment
- rowdy behaviour groups hanging around
- street drinking
- aggressive begging drug dealing
- kerb crawling
