The game went the way of Coyotes B, taking a 3-0 win, in a game in which they outplayed the A team. This certainly shook Coyotes A, with them having to play a strong Voodoo side in the semi, leaving Coyotes B the easier game against Team North Wales. Both sides came through their semi-final game, albeit with Coyotes A only sealing victory in the last few minutes. Welsh Dragon Cup 2006 - Port Talbot

After another year of glory in the NIHL, the Pendlebury Coyotes took on the challenge of the Welsh Dragon Cup, held in Port Talbot, South Wales. This tournament would pit the Coyotes against some of the best teams from not only the South of England and Wales, but also Germany, as EV Pfronten were out to show they could take on Britain. The tournament started in typical fashion, with a Coyotes win, but the 7-0 drubbing of Swindon Flames also send the message out to everyone, that the Coyotes were here to win.

The first game also showed the Coyotes that Southern hockey was played a lot more physical than it is in the North, with players from ball and ice hockey (Played full-contact), making up the rosters for most the teams. This would be a part of the game the Coyotes would need to adapt to, as referees throughout the tournament, accepted the fact that contact and fights would occur, and only punish them with minor penalties. This would be an attitude which would later cost the Coyotes.

The second game saw a tighter and cleaner affair, with a 3-2 win over Welsh team Gaer Allstars. This put Coyotes in charge in the Tournament with 2 wins from their opening 2 games. Next up were Bridgend Dynamos. Again a fairly local team, who play a clean skilled game, giving the Coyotes the chance to really show their stuff against an opposition who could hold their own with playing dirty. The game finished 3-0 for the Coyotes, with Zarren Camilleri, and Ben Pepper-Proctor both adding to their already growing list of points.

Swindon Mustangs were next to take on the undefeated Coyotes team, and with a team made up of ice hockey players, it was clear from the outset that the Mustangs only had one thing in mind, and that was to play rough. Coyotes grabbed 3 goals and effectively killed off the game and began to pass the puck and keep possession. However the team from Swindon took exception to this, with first Carl Ashton, and then Andrew Duxbury being took out after taking the puck around the Swindon players.

These offences however which would have been meet with 5 minute major penalties in the NIHL or any other Northern league, were met with 1 minute minor penalties, meaning the Swindon players could continue to do so without the risk of a major penalty or ban. With the referee's again adopting this attitude, it was only a matter of time before a player was seriously injured.

The Coyotes next faced Wadwbridge Wizards. The Wizards with only a short bench, couldn't handle the class of a Coyotes team growing in confidence, and wound up on the wrong end of a 4-0 win for the Coyotes. In their penultimate game of the day, Coyotes met a team much closer to home in the form of Team Revolution, and renewed their rivalry from the NIHL, in the Welsh Dragon Cup. Coyotes knew all about Revolution from the previous

The game itself was one of the best so far in the tournament, however it would be the Coyotes first lose of the tournament, as they went down 3-1, but this didn't take away from some of the excellent hockey that was not only played in this game, but in every Coyote game throughout the day.

The second day started just as the first one did, with a thumping win. This time it was against Pontypool, as every player on the team registered at least a point in a 10-0 win. This was the biggest win of the tournament so far, and kept Coyotes firmly on track for a win. With the Pontypool win boosting confidence to a new level, Coyotes went into the game against Barbarians looking for another 3 points. This was gained through a 3-1 win, but it the hit on star forward Zarren Camilleri on the final buzzer, that was the talking point, leaving the Coyotes player down, with a serious blow to the chest. This was another intentional hit, which went uncalled, with serious injury narrowly avoided.

Caerphilly Conquerors were next up, and what looked like another 3 points, ended in both team going home early. With the time seemingly up, and another victory for the Coyotes, their was a minor confrontation between two players. The player from Caerphilly then threw a punch, and a fight developed. However it was the actions of the Caerphilly players which threw the game into controversy. They firstly cleared their bench to join in the fight, with the netminder leaving his crease to become involved.

Once there the Caerphilly player used their helmets to hit the Coyotes players on the pad, leaving 2 of the with head, nose and neck wounds. Once the player had left the pad it was decide that both teams were to be disqualified from the tournament.
